team we had lost to the previous day by 60. With three boards left,

we felt that our lead had disappeared; therefore, vulnerable against not, En held void in spades, 5 hearts to the 10,8, Q doubleton of diamonds and AQJ six times in clubs. The auction ended in 5 hearts (!) by En, doubled. When the dummy flopped, I kept looking for En's hearts, but all was well. Down 1 for a nice 6 IMP gain – the opponents seemed disheartened. On the penultimate hand En held stiff – stiff in the majors, KQJ10xx in diamonds and 5 clubs to the A. Not vul against vul. En opened 1D and drove the hand to the 5 level against the opponents 4H, even though I kept bidding spades. Down 1 again, for a gain of 11. Good ending, we won the match by nine after surviving a misfit on the last hand. I wonder if En will turn in her cat spots and stripes now that she's platinum? Somehow, I doubt it!!!!!

vantage. She would show the majors with only four cards in each, or invite on a hand that would keep their opponents out of a cold game.

Over the years Anita has played with many partners and even more teammates. Each partner feels like they can win with Anita. She takes great joy outplaying the top professionals by seeing a card combination or a safety play that was not taken at the other table to guarantee a winning result.

Anita won her first Regional in New York playing with Mark Epstein, a fine player now living in Las Vegas. Anita's favorite partner was Jeannie Grunwald, with whom she played for over 30 years. They formed a powerful women's team, and were in the running for the top spot at the Nationals the year Jeannie died. Anita and I represented the United States in the world championships.
